A LETTER FROM MICHAEL WOODCOCK

Who makes you laugh? Victoria Wood always manages to make me laugh. There was a sketch she did a few years ago, a take-off of the film “Brassed Off”. In it the local band, The Associated Fetlers and Warp and Weft Adjuster Silver Band, heard how Tony Blair “was worried about the North-South divide, so he’s making everything ‘the South’”. In ten minutes time their local northern band would then be in Surrey! It was a wonderful piece of humour and plays into that semi-serious bit of British stereotyping that is the north-south divide. Did you know there was a similar thing going on in the Holy Land 2000 years ago? Those in Jerusalem in the south rather looked down their noses at anyone who came from Galilee in the north. Galilee was a predominantly agricultural area, and was worked intensively to export wheat, olives and wine. There were some who were rich, a reasonably sized middle class, but the majority was tenant farmers and day labourers. This bred a certain kind of toughness. Apparently the inflexibility and the fearlessness of the Galileans was proverbial. So those in Jerusalem saw Galilee as a strange place because of its dialect and its conservative country ways.

So where did Jesus come from? Well he came from The North, Galilee. So those similar stereotypes and suspicions would have been around even then. I find it heartening that Jesus was a “northerner”. (Although you may think I myself am a southerner... my mother and grandmother were both Lancastrians, so I reckon I have at least 50% northern genes!)

I think there is still a grittiness, a certain toughness to be found in the north. Perhaps this is something Jesus himself would have taken with him through life? That grittiness was coupled with a strong sense of justice, but also love and mercy. So there was a compassionate side to this strength of character; the best of both worlds.

Now I say a lot of this with tongue-in-cheek of course, although I do believe Christians today need that blend of toughness and compassion. Our faith is hard at times. We need to stick at it. We also need to have a strong, clear voice that is unafraid and speaks out against injustice and oppression. We are not “soft” because we are Christian. In fact, quite the reverse, we take on the fullness of life, its joys and its sorrows, and we face them head on. May we do so with some of that northern grit as we seek to reflect the character of Christ.

The death occurred on 1st February of John Inman. John came into this world 82 years ago at Crosthwaite Mill. Sadly his father passed away when John was only 18 months old, and his sister Margaret but 3 months old, whereupon they and their mother moved to Simpson Ground. His school days were spent at Cartmel Fell School. John left school at 14 and worked for a while for his uncle Tom at Strickland Hill at Witherslack. He married Kathleen in 1949, and in 1956, they were offered the tenancy of High Town Yeat where they lived until 1967, when they moved to Strickland Hill at Witherslack. They had 26 years there, where they farmed quietly and successfully, raising 4 children as time went by. In 1992, John and Kathleen retired to live at Allithwaite and enjoyed having a caravan at Lamony, and holidays in Australia, Canada, Spain and Tenerife. Sadly, John suffered a stroke 3 years ago, and had to go into the care of Cartmel Grange Nursing home. Following a well-attended funeral service his mortal remains were laid to rest within yards of where he first came into the world.

Lent Course – “Not a Tame Lion” by Hilary Brand.

Our Lent course this year is based on the writings of C.S.Lewis. As in previous years we will be using film clips to help us explore the themes further and the course uses clips from the following three films; “The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe”, “Prince Caspian”, and “Shadowlands”.

Hilary Brand writes this;

“We would all like a religion that kept us within our comfort zone. But just as C.S.Lewis’s Aslan is not a tame lion, neither is the Christ of the gospels always a comfortable Saviour, saying and doing things that are often unexpected and challenging. Nor is this a comfortable Lent course. Lent, of course, was never intended to be a time of comfort. It was traditionally a time of sackcloth and ashes and rumblings in the stomach, a drab, grey run-up to the glorious resurrection theme of Easter. Discomfort is much less fashionable nowadays. But whatever your Lenten attitude to chocolate or alcohol, maybe, for this Lent at least, you will be willing to submit your spirit to a little bit of mental exercise and your mind to a little bit of spiritual challenge.”

OUR CATHEDRAL TREASURY

Before the Reformation, almost every church would have had a Rood screen, with figures of Christ, flanked by the Virgin Mary and St John above it. The Puritan iconoclasts were so effective that only three figures of Christ survive in England and Wales. St Anthony's Cartmel Fell has one of these, sadly mutilated so that it has neither arms nor feet, but still a movingly beautiful, gaunt, mediaeval, oak figure. For its safety, it was on display in the Kendal Museum for many years, but the PCC decided that it would be more appropriately housed in the Carlisle Cathedral Treasury, where it is now beautifully displayed in a sacred setting with other treasures from churches all over our diocese. St Anthony's Elizabethan silver chalice is there too. The Treasury is well worth a visit if you are in Carlisle. Last year, before the figure left the benefice, Tony Schofield carved a fine oak replica, and this has been mounted on the east wall of St Anthony's as a focal point of a new corner for private prayer.

Recording of Road Defects

You will be all too aware of problems with

road surfaces and drainage throughout the Parish and many of you will have reported them to Cumbria Highways' Hotline (0845 609 6609). At the same time the PC, supported by our County Councillor, has been pressing highways managers to get on with repairs to the worst problems.

It would be helpful if the PC was aware of all road problems and in particular if they have been reported, so that we can concentrate our efforts. We plan to provide forms in Exchange and WI meetings for people to record road problems and whether they have been reported or not. The PC will do its best to see that these reports are collated and an up to date list kept available. Your help would be appreciated.

Quarries – Tenants wanted

The PC is the registered owner of 12 ex-quarries held in trust for the Parish. These quarries were originally designated in the 1814 Heversham (enclosure) Award for the extraction of roadstone. They have not been used for that purpose for over 150 years and are now isolated plots of marginal land scattered throughout the Parish mostly ranging in area from 0.15ha to 0.64ha. Seven of these plots already have tenants, using the land for grazing, conservation or even, in one instance, as a personal haven and all at nominal rents. The PC would be happy to hear from any local people who fancied taking on one of the remaining plots for their own satisfaction and for the benefit of the community. Broadband in Brigsteer

Being so far from the Crosthwaite telephone exchange, Brigsteer experiences low broadband speeds, with slow downloads. You may therefore be interested in a presentation in Helsington & Brigsteer village hall at 7.0pm on Wednesday, 6th April at which Kencomp, a local company, will explain their microwave provision of fast broadband. If sufficient people in Brigsteer were interested, they could install a microwave link to the village, offering broadband speeds up to 50Mb/s to subscribers, with a discount on their normal installation charge. SLDC Consultation on Sites for Housing and Commercial Development

We have until 15th April to respond to South Lakeland District Council's Land Allocation Development Plan, which lists sites proposed for house building and commercial development over the next 15 years. People living in Helsington and Prizet will be affected mainly by sites proposed for commercial development around the two filling stations on the A591. Residents of Brigsteer will be affected by any of three sites suggested for housing in the village: RN213 on the north side of the Underbarrow road between the Wheatsheaf and the village hall, on which SLDC estimate 13 houses could be built (at least 35% affordable homes), RN214 on the Underbarrow road opposite the junction with

the Lyth valley toll road (11 houses, 100% affordable homes) and RN227 on the fields adjoining the moss road to Levens (unassessed, but big enough for about 15 houses, 35% affordable homes). Maps of these sites and other information are displayed in the bus shelter in Brigsteer and full details are available on the Land Allocations DPD page of the planning section of the www.southlakeland.gov.uk website (look especially for the Brigsteer Fact Sheet). 'Drop in' days at which you can ask questions are at Levens Institute on 28 February and Kendal Town Hall on 2 March, both 1.30 - 7.30 pm.

The consultation period provides your chance to have your say on SLDC's proposals, which could provide affordable housing and create jobs in the parish but could also significantly change Brigsteer village. The best option is to respond on-line, but paper response forms are also available from SLDC. If you need help in finding or understanding the information on the website or would like paper response forms, please contact Mike Fleetwood 68148 or Alan Davies 68837.
