### A LETTER FROM TONY FITCH

#### WE ARE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER

A number of years ago, when I was under much personal pressure and stress, a good friend of mine, having heard my tale of woe, offered me his support saying "we are all in this together". Simple words, but they gave me great reassurance - he would be with me during that difficult time and I would not be alone, struggling by myself.

In our recent commemoration of the outbreak of the First World War, we have been encouraged, through recorded memories, photographs and letters, to try to share the experiences of warfare in the trenches and the experiences of those keeping the home fires burning, waiting for news – good or bad. We were encouraged to be "in it" with them.

With the great advancements in the media, we are now thrust almost instantly into the thick of the world's troubles. For better or for worse, nothing much can happen in the world – even in the remotest corners – without the press, or at least someone with a mobile phone, being there and transmitting it to millions of listeners or viewers. We switch on the news and we are immediately with the flack-jacketed reporter crouching behind a low wall watching a gun battle rage; we are with the pathetic stream of refugees leaving their ruined city; or we are in the hospital watching the brave medics struggling with huge numbers of injured civilians. Worst of all, we are with those innocent young children scarred for life by conflicts they can barely understand. It is often almost too much to bear. But they, the victims, are probably encouraged by knowing that through the media we, the outside world, are to some extent "in it" with them, albeit in a very indirect way.

Sadly we are also all in this together, not just because of the images we see, and not because of the knock-on effect that it may have on us as a result of globalisation (e.g. oil prices), but because in many cases we learn that the troubles have been stoked up by armaments, money, equipment and know-how supplied by our own country. We really are rightly, and in some respects perhaps wrongly, in this together.

But where is God? We might well ask. It is sometimes difficult to understand, but He is surely there in the midst of the suffering. He did not make the suffering. He gave mankind free-will – the privilege of choice. If God was just a divine puppet-master then maybe all these conflicts would be avoided, but we would have no individual identity, no freedom of choice and therefore little quality in life. We get the benefits of this freedom, but we must share the burdens when, as so often happens, we get it wrong. But we can share these burdens with each other and with our Maker. Jesus never said it would be easy. He, too, had to suffer, and through his Holy Spirit he is here and shares our suffering with us. Until we, humankind, get things right – until there is genuine repentance and a humble return to the Lord – there will be conflict

and suffering, but He calls himself "Immanuel", "God with us". He is in this with us. He is just a prayer away.

#### Mary in Islam

The list of September feast-days in the Calendar of *Common Worship* includes one in honour of the Virgin Mary, specifically the celebration of her birth, traditionally dated as September 8<sup>th</sup>. Several years ago I wrote about the non-biblical stories of Mary's birth and her family — narratives that date back to the early centuries of Christianity. This time I thought it would be interesting to look at way Mary is treated in Islam.

Mary is, of course, recognised and honoured as the mother of Jesus, who is accepted by Moslems as a major prophet. The Arabic form of her name transliterates as Mariam. She has many titles within this tradition, for example, The Virgin, The Purified, the Exalted, Queen of the Saints, to name but a few; and she has the distinction of being the only woman mentioned by name in the Qur'an. Indeed, the nineteenth chapter of the Qur'an is named after her, which is a clear sign of her importance, since there are in total only eight people who have chapters named after them, and Mary (Mariam) is the only female figure. In the Qur'an Mary's mother's name is Hannah, which corresponds the name of Anne or Anna in the Christian tradition; and there is a further similarity in that Mary's parents are described as being elderly and childless before giving birth to Mary. Being therefore seen as an answer to prayer, she was dedicated to the service of God. Hannah prayed for Mary to be protected from Satan, and there is a *hadith* (deriving from oral tradition: not the Qur'an itself) which says that the only children born without the touch of Satan were Mary and Jesus.

The Qur'an states that Mary grew up in the temple of prayer, under the care of the prophet Zechariah who, when he entered her prayer-chamber, often found that she had been provided with food from God. We hear nothing more about her upbringing. But what does figure is Jesus' virgin birth. The first mention of this is a report of Mary's question to Jibril (Gabriel) about how she shall conceive when she has had no relations with a man. Jibril replies that God can accomplish all things, and that the virgin birth of Jesus will be a sign for all mankind. Later it is stated that God breathed 'His spirit' into Mary while she was still chaste. We can see some similarities with the Christian tradition in this, although of course Islam does not accept that Jesus is God incarnate. But the actual birth-narrative differs from that in the Bible. According to the Qur'an, when Mary's labour-pains began, she held on to a palm-tree. A voice reassured her, and on that day, vowing to speak to no man, she gave birth. She immediately took the child to the temple, where she was taunted by all the men present with the exception of Zechariah, who alone believed in the virgin birth. When she was questioned by the others about how she had been able to conceive and give birth while still unmarried, Mary pointed to the baby Jesus, who then began to prophesy from the cradle.

Islamic literature does not provide any narratives about Mary's later life, but she is believed to have been buried in the Kidron Valley, at the foot of the Mount of Olives. Although the site is now run jointly by the Greek and Armenian churches, Muslims who visit will find a mihrab showing the direction of the Kaaba in Mecca and thus the direction they need to face when they pray there.



Now is the time to start thinking about filling a shoebox for a child who will otherwise probably have nothing this Christmas ... or last Christmas ... in fact many of the children we have seen have never in their lives had any toys or gifts of any kind.

Empty shoeboxes and leaflets will be available in your church very soon, so please take one. They will be collected in early November ready for our local team to hand them out in early December.

We have been hugely encouraged by the tremendous support for Boxes of Hope, Cumbria in its first year. With your support, we have been able to reach over 9,000 children with shoebox gifts; finish the building of a school extension; sponsor the education of 36 children; buy a new minibus for transporting young disabled people to a day centre and for taking children on outings when funds allow; pay the electricity bill for an after school club which would otherwise have closed; provide money for dressings and ointment in 2 villages where residents had nasty lacerations; supply school uniform and other new clothing to hundreds of children; provide huge boxes of stationery supplies to various schools; fund a group of children to go to the zoo. We have sent teams in December to give out the shoeboxes, April to visit the new school extension and July to take 2 groups, each of 40 children, to a summer camp for their first ever holiday. All these trips have been self funded. Our administration costs are minimal and we are all volunteers, so all money we raise goes to where it is needed.

Our latest challenge is to raise money to buy a commercial washing machine for Tinca School. Attendance at school is often poor because the children have no clean clothes (because they have no running water at home) and they are ridiculed by their classmates for being dirty and smelly. If you would like to make a small donation, every little helps. Or you may like to hold a coffee morning.

#### How to Rent - a Checklist

For people who cannot afford to buy their own home, and don't qualify for social housing, the only option is to rent in the private sector. There's a shortage of affordable private rented housing across South Lakes, partly due to the number of holiday homes, but where private renting is available it can often feel daunting for both tenant and landlord. The government has published 'How to rent - The

checklist for renting in England'. The checklist is designed for future and existing assured short-hold tenants in the private rented sector, and gives a useful summary of rights and responsibilities, with helpful suggestions on questions to ask. It includes links to other websites for more detailed information. #### Be wise to Scams

We are hearing of more and more scams in our area, stay safe with our tips.

#### Be Wise

- Government and financial institutions will *never* ask for information by email.
- Don't give information yourself, instead confirm what the cold caller already has. Beware Scammers have a surprising amount of accurate data.
- Never give complete passwords or full account information but instead confirm certain letters or the last few digits.
- If someone phones you, take their details and phone them back later that day *from a different phone.* Scammers often keep the call connected so phoning back immediately from the same phone is like being put on hold and doesn't create a new call.
- Request written information before making a decision, but beware of giving your address if they don't already have it.
- Don't give anyone 'remote' access to your computer over the phone.

#### Signs of a scam

- The call, letter, e-mail or text has come out of the blue.
- You are asked to send money in advance.
- You are under pressure to respond quickly, no time to think about it or get advice.
- You're offered something for nothing and it seems too good to be true.
   Scare tactics are used, for example claiming your computer has been hacked or identity stolen.

#### What to do if you have been scammed

- Report it to Action Fraud on **0300 123 2040** to help stop it happening to others.
- If you've used your credit or debit card ask your bank for a chargeback.

## Some yummy recipes for you to try this September:

# Butternut squash soup with chilli & crème fraîche

#### **Ingredients**

1 butternut squash, about 1kg, peeled and deseeded

2 tbsp olive oil

1 tbsp butter

2 onions, diced

1 garlic clove, thinly sliced

2 mild red chillies, deseeded and finely chopped

850ml hot vegetable stock

4 tbsp crème fraîche, plus more to serve

#### Method

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Cut the squash into large cubes, about 4cm/1½in across, then toss in a large roasting tin with half the olive oil. Roast for 30 mins, turning once during cooking, until golden and soft.

While the squash cooks, melt the butter with the remaining oil in a large saucepan, then add the onions, garlic and ¾ of the chilli. Cover and cook on a very low heat for 15-20 mins until the onions are completely soft.

Tip the squash into the pan, add the stock and the crème fraîche, then whizz with a stick blender until smooth. For a really silky soup, put the soup into a liquidiser and blitz it in batches. Return to the pan, gently reheat, then season to taste. Serve the soup in bowls with swirls of crème fraîche and a scattering of the remaining chopped chilli.

#### Damson cobbler

#### **Ingredients**

900g/2lb damsons, washed and stalks removed

100g/4oz caster sugar

For the cobbler topping

225g/8oz self-raising flour

2 tsp baking powder

75g/3oz chilled butter, diced

100g/4oz <u>caster sugar</u>, plus 1 tablespoon

a pinch of <u>salt</u> 1 medium egg

100ml/4fl oz buttermilk

15g/1/2oz <u>flaked almonds</u>

#### Method

Spread the damsons over the base of a 2 litre/3½ pint shallow ovenproof dish and sprinkle with the caster sugar. Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5.

Sift the flour, baking powder, the 100g/4oz of caster sugar and a pinch of salt into a bowl or a food processor, add the butter and work together until the mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs.

Break the egg into the buttermilk and beat together well. Add to the dry ingredients and mix together lightly into a soft, sticky dough. Drop walnut-sized spoonfuls of the mixture over the top of the damsons, leaving a little space between each one, then sprinkle with the flaked almonds and the remaining 1 tbsp of sugar.

Bake in the oven for 30-35 minutes until golden and bubbling, covering it loosely with a sheet of foil if it is browning a little too quickly. It is done when a skewer, pushed into the middle of the cobbler topping, comes away clean. Leave to cool briefly before serving with some custard, double cream or crème fraîche.
