## GENERAL RULES

The classes are open to all those living in the parish of Crosthwaite and Lyth and the adjoining parishes of Underbarrow, Crook, Witherslack, Winster, Cartmel Fell and Bowland Bridge, Brigsteer and Helsington, and Levens, as well as members of village organisations.

Entry forms and fees must be submitted at the Memorial Hall on Tuesday $11^{\text {th }}$ July 2023 between 7:00 pm and 9:00 pm when registration will take place, or may be delivered or posted to Pat Howarth, Cedar Lodge, Crosthwaite, Kendal, LA8 8HX TO ARRIVE on Tuesday $11^{\text {th }}$ July 2023.

Every exhibitor must have his or her own form. Entries may not be made in joint names. Only one entry per person in any class.

The only people allowed into the hall on the morning of the show will be exhibitors in order to stage their pre-registered exhibits. Where children are exhibitors, parents may attend to supervise. Staging starts at 8:30 and doors will close to exhibitors at 10:00. Judging will start promptly at 10.30.

The judges shall have power, according to the standard of any exhibit, to reduce or withhold any prize.

Presentation and quality of all the exhibits are important criteria, and the decisions of the judges will be final.

Exhibitors may remove their exhibits or cards after 3:30 pm. Exhibits not removed by $3: 45 \mathrm{pm}$ will be made available to the public by donation. The committee cannot accept responsibility for any items remaining in the hall after this time.

All matters not provided for above shall be left to the discretion of the Show committee.

## ALL RULES MUST BE ADHERED TO STRICTLY

## CATEGORY A - CUT FLOWERS

Exhibitors should bring their cut flowers on the morning of the Show and use the vases provided for presentation (except class 10, where the exhibitor will provide their own bowl).

## CATEGORY B - FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

- Paper plates, provided by the committee on the day of the Show, are to be used for all fruit and vegetable classes where required with the exception of classes 27 and 28.
- All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor.
- Stalks to be left on cabbages and the calyces on tomatoes.
- Stalks should be intact on fruit wherever possible.

Pistachio, Courgette, and Lemon Tray Bake (CLASS 71)
Ingredients:

| 175 g shelled Pistachio nuts | 1.25 tsp bicarbonate of soda | For icing topping |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| 250 g caster sugar | 3 eggs | 175 g icing sugar |
| 200 g butter | 140 g full fat Greek yoghurt | 2 tsp lemon curd |
| 280 g plain flour | 3 lemons, zest and juice $(2+1$ for topping $)$ |  |
| 1.25 tsp baking powder | 140 g grated courgette |  |

## Method: Pre-heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas Mark 4

Grease a $20 \times 30 \mathrm{~cm}$ baking tin/tray and line the base with baking parchment.
Put 150 g of Pistachios and the caster sugar into a food processor and blitz until nuts are finely ground. Tip this mix into a bowl with the butter, flour, baking powder, bicarbonate of soda, eggs, yoghurt and the zest and juice from 2 of the lemons. Beat with an electric whisk until combined. Stir in the grated courgette.
Spoon the mixture into the baking tin/tray and bake for 35 to 40 minutes. Continue to cook a little longer if necessary. Test with a skewer to check it is fully cooked.
Topping: Sift the icing sugar into a bowl and gradually stir in enough lemon juice from the third lemon to get a loose consistency.
Spread lemon curd over the cooled cake and drizzle icing over.
Roughly chop the remaining 25 g of Pistachios and scatter them over the top.
Cut cake into squares and select four for your display.

Exhibits in Art, Photography and Handicraft classes. Once shown in the Show they may not be entered again.
To help with the display of Artwork and Photography please bring exhibits to the hall on Tuesday $11^{\text {th }}$ July between 7:00 pm and 9:00 pm.

## ARTWORK

All Artwork must be mounted or framed. Any Artwork that is framed must be strung for hanging. Artwork can be produced using any medium and must be the original work of the exhibitor.
The exhibitor's name must be clearly written on the BACK of the artwork in the TOP RIGHT HAND CORNER.
