

A LETTER FROM TONY FITCH



Looked at objectively, prayer can appear to be a very strange thing – talking to and conversing with someone who is not physically present.

In prayer we are, as it were, stepping into another, non-tangible dimension – one of belief, faith and trust - trust that there is someone out there greater than us, with limitless capabilities, who will listen and respond.

Prayer is in many ways a private thing – a communication between oneself and one's Maker. There is no right or wrong way to pray. We each find what is right for us because each of us is created

differently and has different needs and joys. There is as much power in a simple but sincere cry for help – "Dear Lord please heal my mother", as there is in a more structured and perfectly worded or set prayer. Some of you may recall a little series on the radio in the mornings long ago – I used to listen to it in my car on the way to work. In it a very ordinary youth in a strong Birmingham accent talks to God as he would to a close friend, launching off with the words "Is that Pearly Gates 5436? Is that you God? I am just phoning to tell you about something that happened yesterday and to ask your advice...."

A non-church-going friend of mine once commented "I guess everyone prays at some time", and I think that is true. Another friend told me how his father, when he was in camp during the Second World War, knelt beside his bed every night to pray. He expected some ridicule, but he got none. I like to think that others may then have had the courage to do the same.

Prayer is never casual, even though the words may, on the face of it, be in a casual style. So called "arrow prayers" – short addresses to the Lord on a special concern or feeling of gratitude that suddenly cross one's mind – are perfectly in order.

There are times in one's life when it is hard to pray, possibly because one is angry and God is the focus of that anger, just as a parent can be the focus of a child's anger. But after the storm there is the calm, and that is when we can allow the Father to be our guide once more.

So how does this communication with God work? How does He hear the cries and supplications of one ordinary little human being – a mere speck on the face of the earth? It is easy to imagine that, in prayer, one is shouting across a huge void to a distant deity, somewhere up in the sky. This is where that third person in the Trinity steps in – the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit was sent to us when Jesus physically left this earth so that we can still be in communication with Him and his Father. The Holy Spirit is, if you like, a two-way radio, transmitter and receiver, between us and the Father and Son.

I confess that I have never heard God actually speak to me, but I do know that in answer to so many of my prayers he influences my thoughts and actions via my heart and mind and brings about answers. Some things might be coincidences, but there are too many coincidences for them all to be coincidences. Sometimes God works in mysterious ways. My son, living in London, once told me that he had bought a bicycle

and was going to save money by cycling across the city to work. I pleaded with him to make sure he wore a crash hat, but he thought he knew better and stubbornly refused. I prayed earnestly for a solution to this impasse. A day or so later, my son reported that someone had stolen his bike and that he was back on public transport.

We are all worriers – some more than others. Worrying is a very negative thing and only takes one deeper into despair. Prayer on the other hand is positive and enables us to do something about our concerns in situations where we would otherwise feel helpless. It is reassuring to have God beside us in such troubled times and indeed through our whole journey through life – leading us to pastures green, quiet waters and beside us even in the valley of the shadow of death. So pray more; worry less!

Amen (Derived from the Hebrew, meaning "truly", "certainly" or "so be it").

Tony Walshaw (79)

Tony's family writes, "Tony was born in Gotham (Loughborough) on 3rd Feb 1944. He moved in early childhood to the Lakes firstly to Low Sadgill in Longsleddle then to High House on Staveley Head Fell and finally to Little Strickland Hill Witherslack. He attended 'Miss Mann's' private primary school in Kendal before passing his 11+ to attend Kendal Grammar School. It was here that he became known as Walter when a teacher misheard his Walshaw surname this nickname stayed with him all his life particularly with his older friends.

Lake District life obviously agreed with him and he became accomplished in rock climbing, sailing, wild camping and fell walking along with developing other interests inspired by his mother Sonia.

He left school at 16 to take up an apprenticeship with Shepherds boat builders in Bowness. Although he did not complete his apprenticeship, his boatbuilding skills were used fully throughout his life building his own sea going yacht 'Ella' as well as several kayaks in addition to running and maintaining his 17 foot Windermere Class yacht 'Atholl' and the lovely steam canoe 'Laughing Water'.

Several other 'normal' jobs followed including running courses for the Brathay Trust, electricity engineer for the Electricity Board, Voluntary Service Overseas in Austria, and engineering jobs at Gilkes and Lancaster University.

Amongst all this be managed to meet Anne at an Old Boys dance at the Grammar School and the pair were married on 20th Jan 1965 at St. Oswald's Church Burneside. A honeymoon followed in Glenridding with Tony whisking Anne off in the sidecar of his Scott motorcycle. Unfortunately, a Winter marriage meant that the Kirkstone Pass was under a fair bit of snow and the bike was unable to reach the top with two on board! There was only one answer and sadly Anne had to walk up, being unable to drive the motorbike!

Karen was born a year later in March 1966 and she travelled the following year with them as they emigrated to Australia as £10 Poms. Tony worked in manufacturing out there and was successful in producing a brother Jamie for Karen before returning to England in 1970 to work at Lancaster University.

Tony now started to take his model making hobby more seriously and started to build up a customer base as well as winning several awards from within the model engineer fraternity. An early customer was Lord Hesketh who at the time had just started Hesketh Racing in Formula I. The Rolls Royce Merlin engine Tony built for him was amazingly intricate and required great patience and skill to complete. Interestingly, many years later this model ended up being owned by Ron Dennis who was then the head of McLaren Formula I team. He was so amazed by the model he sent the editor of their in-house magazine up to Witherslack to interview Tony about

how he set about producing it. After publication Tony was asked to give a talk to Ron Dennis and the 300 plus FI engineers at McLaren HQ in Woking and they were apparently blown away by Tony's skills

In 1986 Tony and Anne moved to Witherslack and he developed his workshop further to help grow his model business. Customers in the USA and Spain as well as the UK recognised his skills and he was able to work full time on his models as well as continue his passions for renovating classic motorbikes, building boats and kayaks, and making improvements to the house at Little Strickland Hill.

Tony was so incredibly passionate and knowledgeable in so many different areas and he will be sorely missed not only by his family but also by the many groups, clubs and organisations that he so enthusiastically became part of."

Rev. Michael Woodcock continues, "What can we say about Tony? It is always impossible to sum up the life of any one person in words alone. We are complex beings and there is an awful lot that goes into making us the people we are. This was no less true of Tony. He had had quite a Victorian upbringing and, in many ways, he belonged to a generation who were defined by their pride and independence. Tony ploughed his own furrow and lived life the way he believed was the right way for him. In many ways this was to be admired. Tony's interests and passions were many and his knowledge and understanding around these interests was deep. He was always wanting to learn new things and was constantly teaching himself. He had great patience and a desire to do things properly and the right way. When required, he could focus his attention on the minutest details — his engineering skills displayed this.

He was a passionate man and, in many ways, a gentle man. He could get frustrated at times, but ultimately was gentle at heart. He became Churchwarden some 7 years or so ago, primarily because no one else was willing to take on that role, but also because he wanted to see this beautiful church restored. Tony was so optimistic. It struck us to the heart when he would always say, "We will win, we will succeed." We needed that optimism and sense of hope. Belonging to a generation that was much more self-sufficient and creative, Tony often thought that we could repair this building ourselves, and just get on with it. Unfortunately, that's when we came up against all the requirements that a listed building has to satisfy when any repair works are done these days. Modern day health and safety law and risk assessments alone mean that we are not allowed simply to take matters into our own hands and do it ourselves. Just as we can imagine any National Trust building would have to go through all the rigorous processes and requirements to be repaired and restored to the highest standards, so too our listed church buildings are subject to such requirements. This was a frustration to Tony, and I am so sad that we have failed so far to complete what we need to do. But we have got a functioning kitchenette now in the Tower and Tony was so pleased that we had at least made some progress in making our church more useable.

That independence of spirit and, let's face it, stubbornness led Tony to scale the heights of the Church Tower twice a year and raise and lower the Flag each Spring and Autumn. If you saw what you had to do to achieve this, then health and safety and risk assessments would have shut it down immediately! But Tony did it.... and he did it just three days before he died, as determined as ever, refusing offers of help "I've done this on my own for years, I don't need any help". Such was the man. We are going to miss his determined spirit, his passion to see this church restored, his sense of optimism and hope. Witherslack needs more people with these attitudes if we are to succeed.

It's fair to say that Tony struggled a bit these past few months. He hated seeing Anne so poorly and in those last few days before his death we think he began to realise his own weaknesses and need of help, and how much he loved Anne and wanted her to come home.

We are complex beings. Tony struggled with his demons, as all of us do. We know he didn't look after himself as well as he should have, but we loved him all the same. Perhaps we can at least give thanks that his passing was swift and without any drawn-out suffering.

Tony, we thank you for the man you were, for the character you were ... with your passion and your determination, for your patient and gentle heart.

And we're going to need others now to keep the Derby Arms in business!

CROOK

When there is a fifth Sunday in the month all churches in the Two Valleys Mission Community plan a joint service or event for the congregations to all meet together. For the last Sunday in April there was a good turn out and everyone met in the



barn at High Farm, Crook at the invitation of the Taylor family. A Thanksgiving for Lambing Service was taken by Rev. Michael Woodcock, the Taylor boys spoke about their different sheep and well known hymns were accompanied by the Burneside Brass Training Band.

Crook Coronation

Every household in the village of Crook had received an invitation to celebrate the Coronation. Many people enjoyed their own events on the Saturday but came together on Sunday. In the morning there was a well attended service of celebration, led by the Vicar Rev. George Briggs at St. Catherine's Church. There were flags and bunting, used at the coronation in 1953, and lovely floral decorations in red white and blue. The Coronation Big Lunch hosted by the Memorial Hall Committee proved very popular with about 100 people enjoying a delicious lunch provided by Alison Thompson Catering. The newly installed ceiling projector proved useful for screening a rolling programme showing the re-run of the highlights from the Coronation service.

CURLEW RECOVERY SOUTH LAKES (see cover photograph)

The haunting call of the curlew is a beautiful reminder of the return of spring. With their distinctive long down-curved bill and large size, curlews are a wonderful part of our local landscape. However, curlews are failing to breed successfully, and their numbers are in catastrophic decline here, and throughout the UK.



Four years ago, a group of volunteers began working to help local breeding pairs, and this year, they formed Curlew Recovery Lakes. South а new charity dedicated to helping the birds to survive and thrive. The Lyth Valley is one of their last lowland breeding strongholds, and even here, curlews are failing to rear chicks. We think only one fledged last year, and the same the year before.

Curlews nest on the ground, favouring open areas to watch out for predators. In common with all ground-nesting birds, they are vulnerable to predation from foxes, badgers, and crows.

The local curlew volunteers work hard to find and protect curlew nests. The team uses electric fences with the permission of the farmers and works closely with farmers to avoid losses during agricultural operations.

An electric fence can exclude ground predators, prevent trampling, and allow farming operations to continue around the nest. At the time of writing (mid-May), the volunteers have found 15 nests and fenced 10, which is excellent news as fencing significantly increases hatching success. However, five nests were lost to predation before they could be fenced.

Every nest counts, and the charity is committed to doing all they can to ensure that these precious birds can thrive. You can follow their work and stay up to date with their latest stories on their Facebook page:

CROOK WI had Dr. Rob David as their speaker for the April meeting. His talk was entitled "A County of Refuge". Many expected he would be speaking about the "Windermere Boys". However, we heard about some of the experiences of immigrants who sought sanctuary in Britain in the 1930's. Groups of children arrived from the Basque area of northern Spain as a result of the Spanish Civil war. Other refugees came from Austria and Czechoslovakia and then after the outbreak of the Second World War Belgians and Poles found sanctuary in Cumbria. Several notable families including some very strong and influential ladies were instrumental in organising accommodation for these homeless people. It proved a most interesting evening.

CROOK Wi's May meeting was held in the afternoon and had a coronation theme. There was a glass of fizz on arrival and crowns provided for everyone. The worries about the high level of pollution in our rivers and lakes is the subject of the resolution to be discussed at the National Federation Annual Meeting. It is the turn of Crook to provide a delegate this year. She is not travelling to Cardiff but will attend virtually and will vote on behalf of those institutes she will be representing. At the conclusion of the business meeting there was a splendid "Jacobs Join" tea party. Three members then gave a performance of "Changing the guard at Buckingham Palace" complete with the soldier in scarlet tunic and bearskin hat.

Apparently in 1700, because of being on the route from Whitehaven, in the village shop in Troutbeck village they were selling anchovies and capers! 
